

The Summer Camp Director's Ultimate Checklist

Decide the theme or focus of the camp.
Determine the age range and skill level of the students who will be attending.
Secure a location and determine the dates and times for the camp. Be sure to keep in mind all the workshops, rehearsals, and performances that you intend on doing with your campers, and make sure the space fits your needs.
Create a detailed schedule of daily activities.
Plan for and purchase necessary supplies. Don't leave out anything! Include scripts, costumes, set materials, and even bandaids!
Make sure you have your staff lined up and confirmed. This should include making sure that all staff and volunteers are properly trained and prepared to provide a safe and enriching environment!
Ensure that all necessary permissions and releases have been obtained from parents and guardians.
Develop clear policies and procedures for the camp. Make sure to think ahead about emergency plans and protocols!
Consider partnering with other organizations or professionals to enhance the camp's programming and resources.
Plan and implement effective marketing and promotion strategies to attract students and build interest in the camp.
Establish a clear and reasonable pricing structure, including any discounts or scholarships that may be available.
Think about transportation, especially if the camp is off-site or involves field trips.
